MISUSE OF THE 999 SYSTEM - HOAX CALLS PC Sarah Bailiff, Youth Engagement Officer Ellesmere Port and Neston

During June 2024, a mobile phone was used to make numerous hoax calls to police on the 999 system, and due to the disruption this was causing by delaying genuine calls, a temporary block was placed on this number.

In January 2025, the same number was used again to call 999 with the person reporting a serious sexual assault. Multiple officers were immediately dispatched on an emergency response to locate the alleged victim. Unfortunately, this again turned out to be a hoax call, with the individual making further calls goading police to find them. It is highly likely that others were encouraging them to do this. As a result of an investigation, the caller was found to be a 13-year-old student from Ellesmere Port who had not been the victim of any crime. This incident will now be dealt with appropriately.

Everyone is reminded that hoax 999 calls use up valuable resources and delay response to genuine emergencies, potentially putting the lives of others at risk.

Police treat hoax calls very seriously as they put others at serious risk, so it's important that people are educated on the dangers and possible consequences. It is an offence to make a malicious or hoax call to the emergency services and hoax callers could face a maximum penalty of up to six months in prison or a fine of £5,000.

All calls to the emergency services are recorded and we can always trace the number, even if the call is made from a withheld number or a public phone box.

If your friend or family member needed to contact the police / fire / ambulance etc. in an emergency, think how you would feel if they were unable to get assistance because the operator had been busy on a hoax call.

The misuse of 999 is a problem that we shouldn't have to deal with. It is highly irresponsible and frustrating for call handlers who are trying to do their job and get help to people genuinely in need.

We are urging parents/carers to help us educate their family members about hoax calling 999.

Please only call 999 for serious and life-threatening emergencies.
